Take the Stress Out of Bonfire Night

We also recommend calming aids such as pheromone devices and thunder shirts as well as environmental help in the way of dens, food and music. 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Let's have a heart to heart

Heart problems sadly affect pets as well as people. Heart disease affects around 10% of cats and dogs in the UK. Early detection is a major factor in helping to manage the condition and increase life expectancy. Often the condition lies undetected until the pet has difficulty maintaining its circulation, leading to signs of congestive heart failure.

Occasionally sudden collapse or even death can unfortunately occur. Early detection may be life-saving.

"Coughing, or a change in your pet's ability to exercise, can indicate that their heart is struggling. Breathing can become laboured, or fast and shallow, and your pet might appear tired or less interested in playing or interacting with you. Weakness or wobbliness can also be an indicator and if your pet collapses

or appears to faint, even if for a short time, it's vital you get them checked. Some pets will go off their food, and others might eat more. Both weight loss or weight gain can be seen, and all pets with a more rounded tummy should be examined for heart disease. "We recommend that all pets receive a health check regularly. This will include a heart check, which should be done at least.

receive a health check regularly. This will include a heart check, which should be done at least annually, and twice a year for older pets or at-risk breeds. At the check, we'll listen for abnormal sounds such as murmurs, or irregular heart rhythms. If we pick up any problems, then we will usually recommend further investigation.
